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

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Statewide seasonal employment advanced by 11.8% from April 2003 to April 2004. The increase was again led by apple work. Agricultural employment displaying an over-the-year increase were apple work (988), onion work (632), other seasonal work (495), other tree fruit work (403), cherry work (362), grapes work (311), bulb work (270), raspberry work (239), miscellaneous vegetables work (111), wheat/grain work (19), pear work (18), cucumber work (7) and strawberry work (5). Declines were experienced in nursery work (-928), potato work (-228), hop work (-211), asparagus work (-66) and blueberry work (-9). Regionally, Western (Area 1) seasonal employment decreased by 8.6% due to a drop in nursery work (-1,003). South Central (Area 2) seasonal employment contracted slightly by 1.3% led by hop work (-293). North Central (Area 3) grew by 12.1% thanks to an increase in other seasonal work (353). Columbia Basin (Area 4) seasonal employment ramped up by an impressive 53.6%, courtesy of a large growth in apple work (744). South Eastern (Area 5) seasonal employment experienced moderate growth of 16.6% due to an expansion in onion work (658). Eastern (Area 6) seasonal employment advanced by a large 89.2% caused by an increase in nursery work (267).


ECONOMIC FACTORS IMPACTING AGRICULTURE


This year's asparagus harvest is off to a good start. Warm weather has helped asparagus growers to their best start in several years. After losing market share to duty-free Peruvian imports and removing acreage in an attempt to balance supply and demand, growers have been rewarded with better prices. A federal commodity purchase will also help drive demand for processed asparagus, keeping excess product off the fresh market. A warm early April free of frost and wind drew the temperature-sensitive crop out of the ground in time for Easter, when demand for fresh spears is high.


Another big cherry harvest is expected this year. It should be close, if not just as big as last year's record crop. A perfect bloom, good pollination and warm weather followed by a cooling to spread the timing of harvest all point to "a second bang-up year," said B.J. Thurlby, president of the Washington State Fruit Commission. Washington cherry growers produced 8.9 million 20-pound boxes of cherries in 2003 and another 2.2 million boxes for canning, freezing and other processing. It was a record year in Oregon, Idaho and Utah as well. This year's Washington State crop is predicted to be about 8 million boxes.

A fast snowmelt is raising concern of a drought. Snowpacks in areas of central Washington are causing the most concern, with most areas in the 70th percentile and at least one basin near Wenatchee at 68 percent of average. The snowpacks in western Washington were 80 percent to 95percent of normal. Most river basins in the Spokane area are running about 20 percent short on snowpack for this time of year. Low river conditions shouldn't impact orchardists. Most orchardists have senior water rights that can't be interrupted. However, Kittitas and Yakima Counties are in the worst shape. Kittitas customers will see their allocations reduced by 12.5 percent. In the Yakima area, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation has projected that holders of junior water rights could get only 65 percent of a normal water supply this year.

STATEWIDE AND REGIONAL TRENDS

Statewide seasonal employment expanded 11.8% from April 2003 to April 2004. Seasonal employment trumped up statewide by 33.9% from March 2004 to April 2004. The crop activity increasing the most in employment from April 2003 to April 2004 was apple work (988). Nursery work had the largest decrease in employment (-928) for that same time period. Asparagus work logged the largest over-the-month gain (4,516) from March 2004 to April 2004. During that same time period, bulb work fell back the most in employment (-869). The statewide weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 was \$7.39 per hour.

Western (Area 1) seasonal employment fell by 8.6% from April 2003 to April 2004. This was echoed by a slightly smaller decrease in seasonal employment of 4.6% from March 2004 to April 2004. Bulb work was the crop activity rising the most (270) in employment from April 2003 to April 2004. Nursery work experienced the largest downturn (-1,003) in employment for that same time period. Miscellaneous vegetables work posted the largest uptick in employment (380) from March 2004 to April 2004. Bulb work shrunk by the greatest amount (-869) during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 1 was \$7.36 per hour. (See pages 14 and 15 for Area 1 detail)

South Central (Area 2) seasonal employment declined by 1.3% from April 2003 to April 2004. However, this was contrasted by a large increase of 38.5% from March 2004 to April 2004. Asparagus work was the crop activity adding the most seasonal jobs (325) from April 2003 to April 2004. Hop work decreased by the largest amount (-293) for that same time period. The largest expansion in seasonal crop employment from March 2004 to April 2004 was asparagus work (1,775). Grapes work posted the largest loss in employment (-255) for that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 2 was \$7.41 per hour. (See pages 16 - 18 for Area 2 detail)

North Central (Area 3) seasonal employment displayed a net gain of 12.1% from April 2003 to April 2004. This was exceeded by a stronger recovery of 23.2% in seasonal employment from March 2004 to April 2004. The crop activity posting the largest overthe-year increase in employment from April 2003 to April 2004 was other seasonal work (353). Cherry work had the largest decrease in employment (-35) for that same time period. Apple work expanded the most in employment (756) from March 2004 to April 2004. Cherry work experienced the greatest decrease in employment (-185) during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 3 was \$7.37 per hour. Columbia Basin (Area 4) seasonal employment expanded by 53.6% from April 2003 to April 2004. This was echoed by a slightly smaller gain of 38.9% in employment from March 2004 to April 2004. Apple work displayed the greatest upturn (744) in employment from April 2003 to April 2004. Nursery work experienced the largest decline (-194) in employment during that same time period. Asparagus work grew by the largest (436) employment from March 2004 to April 2004. Nursery work produced the weakest demand (-53) in employment during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 4 was \$7.46 per hour. (See pages 21 - 23 for Area 4 detail)

South Eastern (Area 5) seasonal employment grew by a respectable 16.6% from April 2003 to April 2004. April 2004 employment bounded up by 74.1% over March 2004, primarily due to the start of asparagus harvest. Onion work employment rose by the greatest amount (658) from April 2003 to April 2004. Asparagus work displayed an over-the-year drop (-584) in employment during that same time period. However, asparagus work ramped up by the largest amount (2,305) of employment from March 2004 to April 2004. Apple work had the largest decline (-321) in employment for that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 5 was \$7.34 per hour. (See pages 24 - 27 for Area 5 detail)

Eastern (Area 6) seasonal employment grew by 89.2% from April 2003 to April 2004. Seasonal employment also charged ahead by 53.5% in April 2004 over March 2004. Nursery work moved forward with the largest increase (267) in employment from April 2003 to April 2004. No agricultural activities showed a decline over the year, however wheat/grain work exhibited the smallest increase (5) in employment during that same time period. Again, nursery work ramped up by the greatest amount of employment (210) from March 2004 to April 2004. Other seasonal work contracted the most jobs (-48) during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for April 2004 in Area 6 was \$7.87 per hour. (See pages 28 and 29 for Area 6 detail)

Methodology

The "Agricultural Workforce Report" uses data from the monthly Seasonal Farm Labor Survey. This is a survey of 600 agricultural growers in the state. They report monthly the number of total and seasonal workers by crop, activity, and wage. Both hourly and piece rates are used. "Seasonal" workers for the purpose of the survey are those working less than 150 days per year. The state is grouped into six areas based on agricultural economic similarity. The tables and charts presented compare the seasonal agricultural employment for the state and the six areas for the current month, previous month and year ago. Percentage increases as well as raw numbers are given. The weighted monthly wage for seasonal employment is given for the state and the six areas. Each crop activity having significant employment is noted as a percentage change for previous month and year ago. The crops having the highest gain and highest decline in employment are highlighted in the narrative. The Farm Labor Abstract is also included. This contains the top four crop activities by employment and wage for each of the six areas. Piece rates are given in addition to hourly wages when available and disclosable. Some variation in the reporting of the seasonal data can be attributed to the requirement that employment be reported in the pay period including the 12th of the month. Due to the fact that the timing of a given crop's harvest and other activities can be affected by weather and other conditions, periods of peak employment do not always fit precisely within this reporting period. This can lead to some variation of estimated employment by crop when comparing activity in similar time periods. The report is used by economists, growers' associations, educators, state agencies, labor unions and outreach workers.

Washington State Employment Security, Labor Market and Economic Analysis

FARM LABOR ABSTRACT APRIL 2004

A mid-month survey of farm labor employment and wages is conducted by the Washington State Employment Security Department. At least five percent of all growers are surveyed for employment data about seasonal workers, type of crop, work activity, wages and their residence. Based on that data, the Washington employment Security Department develops estimates on the size of the workforce, average wages for each crop activity, and whether workers commute, live within the state, or come in from outside of Washington State. These data are reported for each agricultural area identified as having similar farm labor characteristics and a significant supply/demand for seasonal hired workforce.

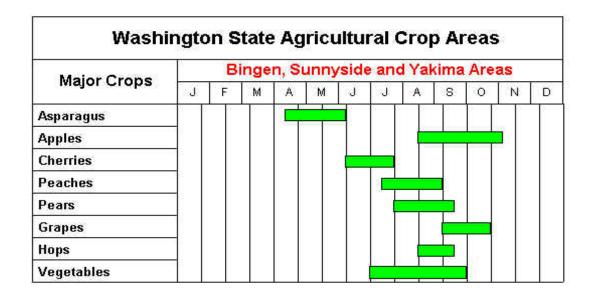

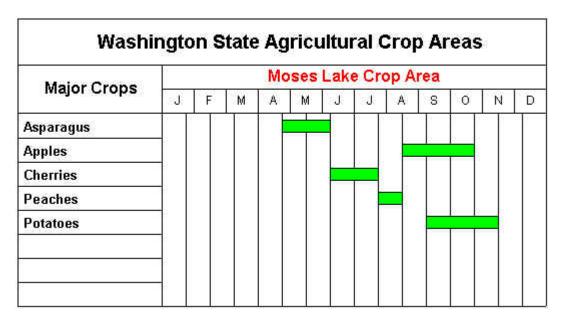
