

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Statewide seasonal employment grew by 11.9% from June 2003 to June 2004. Agricultural employment displaying an over-the-year increase was cherry work (7,197), raspberry work (519), grape work (428), other seasonal work (148), strawberry work (142), blueberry work (99) and miscellaneous vegetables work (42). Declines were experienced in apple work (-1,269), nursery work (-552), potato work (-351), other tree fruit work (-282), asparagus work (-182), hop work (-157), bulb work (-95), pear work (-61), cucumber work (-58), onion work (-18) and wheat/grain work (-3). Regionally, Western (Area 1) seasonal employment decreased by 1.2% due to a drop in nursery work (-436). South Central (Area 2) seasonal employment also declined by 3.2%, thanks to jobs being shed in cherry work (-663). North Central (Area 3) seasonal employment, however, ramped up by 36.8%, courtesy of a huge bump in cherry work (4,908). Columbia Basin (Area 4) seasonal employment surged ahead by a respectable 17.5%, also led by cherry work (1,065). Eastern (Area 6) seasonal employment declined by 1.7%, due to a drop in other seasonal work (1,065).


ECONOMIC FACTORS IMPACTING AGRICULTURE


The Washington-Oregon cherry crop won't be a record one because damage from rain this month was greater than first thought, according to a leading official. B.J. Thurlby, president of the Yakima-based State Fruit Commission, had predicted an 11 million to 12 million box crop. Now, he says it will be more like 9 million to 10 million, 20-pound boxes, falling below the 2003 record of 11.5 million. Fewer cherries, along with good quality and strong retail demand, should keep prices from falling as much as they usually do as the season continues. The average warehouse sales price of Bings was \$35.70 a box. Rainiers were \$61.04. That compares with \$33.28 and \$60.20, respectively, a year ago.


Northwest cherry growers could soon be shipping to Mexico while the state's apple industry is in line for some tariff relief, Governor Locke announced from a trade conference in Mexico City. U.S. Red and Golden Delicious apples are hit with a 47 percent tariff at the Mexican border, while cherries have been held up by expensive inspection and other regulatory requirements. Apple shipments were as high as 9.6 million boxes when the tariff was temporarily suspended in 2000-2001, although a large crop that year also increased exports. Last season, Washington sent 6 million boxes to Mexico. Estimates have been that another 2 million boxes could be exported if the tariff was lifted.

The irrigation for Eastern Washington has improved somewhat since the last projections. Federal Bureau of Reclamation officials lessened the potential for irrigation-water rationing this summer. They announced that all users should receive at least 82 percent of a full supply. The new estimate is an improvement from the May 1 projection of a 70 percent supply.

STATEWIDE AND REGIONAL TRENDS

Statewide seasonal employment expanded 11.9% from June 2003 to June 2004. Seasonal employment ramped up statewide by 122.3% from May 2004 to June 2004. The crop activity increasing the most in employment from June 2003 to June 2004 was cherry work (7,197). Apple work had the largest decrease in employment (-1,269) for that same time period. Cherry work logged the largest over-the-month gain (20,898) from May 2004 to June 2004. During that same time period, asparagus work fell back the most in employment (-1,985). The statewide weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 was \$7.31 per hour.

Western (Area 1) seasonal employment decreased by 1.2% from June 2003 to June 2004. This was contrasted by a large increase of 61.3% in seasonal employment from May 2004 to June 2004. Raspberry work was the crop activity rising the most (519) in employment from June 2003 to June 2004. Nursery work experienced the largest downturn (-436) in employment for that same time period. Strawberry work posted the largest uptick in employment (1,262) from May 2004 to June 2004. Rhubarb work shrunk by the greatest amount (-116) during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 in Area 1 was \$7.29 per hour. (See pages 14 - 16 for Area 1 detail)

South Central (Area 2) seasonal employment declined by 3.2% from June 2003 to June 2004. However, this was contrasted by a large increase of 140.1% from May 2004 to June 2004. Apple work was the crop activity adding the most seasonal jobs (574) from June 2003 to June 2004. Cherry work decreased by the largest amount (-663) for that same time period. The largest expansion in seasonal crop employment from May 2004 to June 2004 was cherry work (5,738). Asparagus work posted the largest loss in employment (-1,086) for that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 in Area 2 was \$7.35 per hour. (See pages 17 - 19 for Area 2 detail)

North Central (Area 3) seasonal employment displayed a net gain of 36.8% from June 2003 to June 2004. This was exceeded by a stronger recovery of 196.1% in seasonal employment from May 2004 to June 2004. The crop activity posting the largest over-theyear increase in employment from June 2003 to June 2004 was cherry work (4,908). Apple work had the largest decrease in employment (-1,060) for that same time period. Cherry work expanded the most in employment (9,755) from May 2004 to June 2004. Apple work experienced the greatest decrease in employment (-1,199) during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 in Area 3 was \$7.26 per hour. Columbia Basin (Area 4) seasonal employment expanded by 17.5% from June 2003 to June 2004. This was exceeded by a much larger gain of 83.7% in employment from May 2004 to June 2004. Cherry work displayed the greatest upturn (1,877) in employment from June 2003 to June 2004. Apple work experienced the largest decline (-780) in employment during that same time period. Cherry work grew by the largest (1,980) employment from May 2004 to June 2004. Asparagus work produced the weakest demand (-404) in employment during that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 in Area 4 was \$7.38 per hour. (See pages 22 - 24 for Area 4 detail)

South Eastern (Area 5) seasonal employment grew by a respectable 14.8% from June 2003 to June 2004. June 2004 employment ramped up by 109.2% over May 2004, primarily due to the start of cherry harvest. Cherry work rose by the greatest amount (1,065) from June 2003 to June 2004. Potato work displayed an over-the-year drop (-141) in employment during that same time period. Cherry work expanded by the largest amount (3,425) of employment from May 2004 to June 2004. Hop work had the largest decline (-214) in employment for that same time period. The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers for June 2004 in Area 5 was \$7.27 per hour. Eastern (Area 6) seasonal employment did not meet the criterion of 500 employees and therefore is not published for the month of June.

Methodology

The "Agricultural Workforce Report" uses data from the monthly Seasonal Farm Labor Survey. This is a survey of 600 agricultural growers in the state. They report monthly the number of total and seasonal workers by crop, activity, and wage. Both hourly and piece rates are used. "Seasonal" workers for the purpose of the survey are those working less than 150 days per year. The state is grouped into six areas based on agricultural economic similarity. The tables and charts presented compare the seasonal agricultural employment for the state and the six areas for the current month, previous month and year ago. Percentage increases as well as raw numbers are given. The weighted monthly wage for seasonal employment is given for the state and the six areas. Each crop activity having significant employment is noted as a percentage change for previous month and year ago. The crops having the highest gain and highest decline in employment are highlighted in the narrative. The Farm Labor Abstract is also included. This contains the top four crop activities by employment and wage for each of the six areas. Piece rates are given in addition to hourly wages when available and disclosable. Some variation in the reporting of the seasonal data can be attributed to the requirement that employment be reported in the pay period including the 12th of the month. Due to the fact that the timing of a given crop's harvest and other activities can be affected by weather and other conditions, periods of peak employment do not always fit precisely within this reporting period. This can lead to some variation of estimated employment by crop when comparing activity in similar time periods. The report is used by economists, growers' associations, educators, state agencies, labor unions and outreach workers.

Washington State Employment Security, Labor Market and Economic Analysis

FARM LABOR ABSTRACT JUNE 2004

A mid-month survey of farm labor employment and wages is conducted by the Washington State Employment Security Department. At least five percent of all growers are surveyed for employment data about seasonal workers, type of crop, work activity, wages and their residence. Based on that data, the Washington employment Security Department develops estimates on the size of the workforce, average wages for each crop activity, and whether workers commute, live within the state, or come in from outside of Washington State. These data are reported for each agricultural area identified as having similar farm labor characteristics and a significant supply/demand for seasonal hired workforce.

- Supply and demand for regular hired farm workers: The June 2004 estimate for regular hired farm workers in this agricultural reporting area was 8,987.
- 2. Factors affecting the farm labor supply and demand situation:
 - a. Crop, market, and weather conditions:

Weather conditions were warmer and drier than normal for the reporting period. Cherry harvest continued. Cherry damage from a storm in the middle of the month continued to be reported. The second cutting of alfalfa was underway. Pea harvest was nearly complete. Sweet corn was being planted as a second crop in some fields. Some asparagus acreage was being taken out in response to the announced closing of the cannery in Dayton. Onion harvest was in full swing.

b. Wages, housing, and transportation:

The weighted seasonal wage for hourly paid farm workers during the pay period in June averaged \$7.40 per hour. Hourly wages ranged from \$7.15 for strawberry sorter/grader/packer, miscellaneous field crops weeder, strawberry irrigator and strawberry vehicle operator to \$10.50 for wheat tractor operator. Typical piece rates were: \$0.15 to \$0.27 per pound for asparagus picking, \$0.15 to \$3.00 per tree for apple thinning and \$3.00 to \$7.50 per box for cherry picking. Housing was limited; transportation was provided by the workers.

- <u>Recruitment and composition of seasonal hired work force:</u> The labor force was estimated to be 67.5% local, 0.8% intrastate, 8.7% interstate, 10.1% foreign and 12.9% unknown.
- d. Changes in production practices: None reported.
